The letter you write can be to your future self or a letter for a loved one to read in the future. How far in the future you set the read date is up to you, but given the length of time traveled in our books, we encourage you to think far ahead. This may be measured in decades or by a significant life event. These letters should be a link to the future reader on your life and emotions on the day of writing. Consider what milestones the reader may have reached and which ones may be yet to come. What advice would you share but also what fears you wish you had considered to discussed with someone. If you are writing a letter to a young child consider what details you wish were documented in writing rather than only in photographs. An image or video can still only share a small piece of the this moment but words can share so much more.

The Trouble with Time Travel, written by Stephen W. Martin and illustrated by Cornelia Li is our pick for our younger readers. While constructing the time machine is easy, Max and Boomer soon learn that interfering with timelines often only leads to bigger messes.

The pick for the more advanced readers is the exhilarating debut novel by Kaliane Bradley, *The Ministry of Time*.
