

Lyman Allyn Park

For nearly a century, the Lyman Allyn Art Museum has been a gathering place where people from all walks of life can explore, exchange ideas, and discover the Power of Art. Now, we want to enhance our service to the greater New London community by expanding multicultural exhibitions and programming, and amplifying our capacity as an educational and cultural destination.

The Lyman Allyn Park is an exciting opportunity to transform our 12 acres of green space by highlighting the Museum's many assets – inside and out – to create a state-of-the-art urban destination that will help revitalize New London and the region.

We will:

- Place our vibrant fine arts museum in a beautifully curated and environmentally sustainable setting with sculpture throughout the grounds
- Become a stimulating and engaging community destination with natural and ecologically healthy areas for learning about responsible stewardship of our planet
- Provide a regional gathering place, easily accessed by foot, bicycle, bus, or car with desirable outdoor facilities for community use, celebrations, and other civic events



This project will strengthen our efforts to more fully achieve the aspirations of people who make art, advocate for social justice, and contribute to environmental sustainability.

To better serve our community and meet the needs of our vibrant multicultural region, we are seeking support for the redevelopment of our 12 acres of green space into an urban art park as well as additional amenities that will complement the Museum experience as a whole.

We anticipate the project will consist of two pathways to become a unified vision.

Park Pathway

- Restore the Museum Green with a welcoming and accessible entry plaza, and incorporate the grounds
- Revitalize the landscape to provide outdoor sculpture sanctuaries with natural seating areas, and a pollinator meadow that will inspire, promote well-being, and educate through interpretive signage about the importance of environmental sustainability and stewardship
- Build an open air 250-seat natural amphitheater to host a multitude of performance and celebratory events for all segments of our community
- Enhance the McCourt 9/11 Memorial Garden as a contemplative and healing space

Museum Pathway

- Add a multi-story Atrium to the West façade as a central gathering space, gift shop, and café overlooking a sculpture garden and terrace
- Enhance the Atrium with gallery space in the North Wing for the exhibition of contemporary multicultural art
- Install solar arrays on reconfigured roofs for renewable, sustainable power production
- Amplify the programming to provide children with hands-on field trips, puppet shows, and plays, and extend to social service nonprofits the ability to offer wellness activities to their families



- More than 4,000 students participate in on-site programs each year through Museum subsidies for field trips and transportation
